Poring over the Lenten texts from John's Gospel, we are dizzied by all of the turning: God turning toward humanity's pain as Jesus weeps at raw and unbearable grief; Jesus turning the stench of Lazarus' death into something confusingly hopeful; Jesus turning into a servant, stooping to wash feet, turning clear water brown with the disciples gathered dust, turning them toward loving and serving their neighbor.

Then humanity's turning away: Peter turning his back on his best friend; Pilate turning and twisting the truth for political gain; The fickle and riled up crowds turning from "hosanna" to "crucify." Then the turning of the earth as grave becomes garden, death turns to life, mourning to dancing.

John's Gospel invites us into a season of intentional turning. Our hearts turn with compassion for those who grieve. Our lives turn toward our neighbor in acts of solidarity and service. Our eyes turn toward the cross and we see Jesus turning the world upside down with love.

We offer this worship series, complete with commentary, liturgy, artwork, prayers, music, and our hope that it will lighten your load and give a faithful and memorable framework to the Lenten journey as you faithfully lead God's people in worship.

John 19:16b-22 (Optional reading: John 12:12-27)

O God, as we enter into this holiest of weeks, turn our hearts toward you that in your suffering, we might understand the consequences of injustice; In your dying, we might know the depths of your love; and in your rising, the earth-turning promise you share with all of creation. Amen.

Each week includes a brief commentary on the primary reading from John's gospel as well as the appointed psalm. Our commentaries are not intended as comprehensive treatments of these texts, but as aids to preachers who are seeking alternative perspectives that are theologically informed and grounded in biblical scholarship. We'll also include a contemporary story that picks up on the themes or insights of the commentary. Most of all we want to help you connect meaningfully and thoughtfully with these living words and help your hearers do the same. We want to help these ancient texts bring new life to you and your communities. In this we're taking our cue from the final words of John 20:

Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that, believing, you may have life in his name.

We think it's worth noting that belief in Jesus's awesome identity isn't the ultimate goal of John's gospel, even though our beloved evangelist trumpets that identity with gusto in the twenty chapters that precede this closing verse. The author of John isn't preaching us towards an intellectual confession or purely emotional conversion. Those are small potatoes: seeds intended to produce something more like a feast or a forest. John (or Joanna) wants us to actually experience the new creation that got Paul so jazzed up in Second Corinthians (5:17). The goal of this gospel is the amazingly opened life that bursts forth from believing that Jesus is who he says he is—a life that is characterized by love and experienced in community, sustained by the advocacy and activity of God's holy Spirit and bathed in the fullness of God's abiding word of grace made flesh. In the gospel, this life is likened to (among other things) the experience of seeing after a lifetime of being blind, of being born completely anew, and of being raised from death.

Even as they were written and gathered in a vastly different context and over a much longer span of time than the gospel of John, the psalms offer a similar vision. We can find in these ancient songs a fairly comprehensive list of lived human experience: joy, grief, fear, loneliness, betrayal, peace, anxiety, anger, relief, illness, gratitude, and awe. This universality has given the psalms a privileged place in the heart of worship for thousands of years.

Psalms were created to be used, both as individual prayers and as community expressions, addressed directly to God. So use them! Sing them! Read them! Speak them! In the Prayers of the Church within this liturgy, you will find petitions that are succinct paraphrases of the psalm for each Sunday. As you are able, explore other songs, hymns, psalm tones, and responses that bring these ancient and yet utterly contemporary prayers, poems, songs and liturgies to life within your community.

Teaching the Gospel to our youngest listeners in worship can be absolutely revelatory, and can also be extremely difficult. There are those children's "sermons" where all those who hear it (including the grown-ups in the room) nod in awe and take a bit of what they've heard into their hearts. There are also those times when everyone who hears it is completely bored, or utterly confused, or just kind of . . . meh.

There is no secret sauce that can be sprinkled onto a children's message guaranteeing that it will "work." But there are a few things that can help:

Let the kids talk

Yep, that means you have no idea what they are going to say . . . keep a sense of humor, and just never hand them the mic; you won't get it back!

Ask them questions

And actually care about their answers, even if they're super weird.

Don't use children's messages to really talk to the adults

This is just going to annoy everybody; talk directly to the kiddos, and only the kiddos.

Don't treat this time as a warm up for the "real" sermon

Our children deserve the best we've got; prepare just like you would for the grown-ups.

Base it on the reading for the day, but remember your audience

We preach on some pretty complicated theological concepts; it's often not cool to bring this all down on the littlest heads in the room. Having said that, don't be afraid if these young preachers manage to glean the theological insights from what you're saying none-the-less. Just go with it.

So, read each week's resource, written by Sara Birkeland, to find some ideas for children's messages during Lent. Use them, tweak them, make them your own, and recognize the honor of being a part of these young lives.
